

Daisy square

The story behind the pattern.

Last summer I crocheted a lot of Dahlia-Daisy squares, but I never made a pattern of the squares only of the Dahlia-Daisy flower. The Dahlia-Daisy square can be crocheted in two different ways, hence the name. One variant becomes a Dahlia and the other a Daisy. Read more about it <u>here.</u>

Introduktion

First you need to do some Dahlia-Daisy flowers, as many as you need. Then you can make Daisy squares!

Alternatives


The pattern below can be adjusted, depending on your own preferences. For example:

- The initial ch on round 1 can be made with a magic ring.
- You can start each round with standing stitches wherever possible, instead of ch.
- You can end each round with an invisible join where ever possible, instead of a sl st.
- I prefer to weave in the ends after each round, for best result. You can choose to do that after finishing all rounds as well.

Dahlia-Daisy flower (round 1-5)

Crochet some Dahlia-Daisy flowers. Use the chart below or you can download a PDF of the pattern Dahlia-daisy flower on my blog (blog.micmarmik.se), <u>click here.</u>

When you have crocheted all the Dahlia-Daisy flowers you need attach all loose yarn threads, if you haven't already.



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Daisy square (round 6-9)

R.6 Now we turn the Dahlia-Daisy flower into a Daisy square.

Change color. Turn the flower so the back is up. Start the round in the stitch that goes around sc r.4 (made by FPdc r.5).

1 sc in the stitch that goes around sc r.4, ch 5, skip two stitches that goes around sc r.4 4 times. Finish with 1 sl st in the first sc. Do not cut the yarn. (Total 20 ch, 4 sc)



R.7

Continue with the same color. The flower is still face down.

1 sl st to ch–5 sp, *<8 dc» (counts as ch 3, 7dc in first repetition) around ch–5 sp, ch 4* 4 times.

Finish with 1 sl st in the first dc. Do not cut the yarn. (Total 1 sl st, 16 ch, 32 dc)






R.8 Continue with the same color. Turn the flower so the front is up. On this round we attach the flower petals.

1 sl st around ch-4 sp, *«2 dc» (counts as ch 3, 1 dc in first repetition) around ch-4 sp, «1 dc BLO, ch 2, 1 dc BLO» in dc r.4 (between 2 sc r.5) and around ch-4 sp, «2 dc» around ch-4 sp, 1 dc in dc, 1 dc BLO in dc r.4 (between 2 sc r.5) and in next dc, 4 dc, 1 dc BLO in dc r.4 (between 2 sc r.5) and in next dc, 1 dc in dc* 4 times. Finish with 1 sl st in first dc. Do not cut yarn.

(Total 8 ch, 56 dc)





R.9

Continue with the same color. 3 sc (counts as 1 ch, 2 sc), *<2 sc, ch 2, 2 sc» in ch-2 sp, 14 sc* 3 times, <2 sc, ch 2, 2 sc» in ch-2 sp, 11 sc. Finish with 1 sl st in first sc. cut the yarn and fasten the yarn threads. (Total 8 ch, 72 sc)

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Symbols explained (US terms):

** times		Repeat the instructions, for example: "*ch 1, 2 sc* 5 times"

		"ch 1 followed by 2 sc, repeated five times"	
** ** times		Short repeats within a longer ones, for example: "*ch 1, **1 sc** 2 times* 5 times"

		"ch 1 and a repeat of 2 sc; all repeated 5 times"
